Minutes of the Board Meeting, June 9<sup>th</sup>, 2021

Councillor's Report (Charlayne Thornton Joe)

- Homelessness continues to occupy the majority of Council's focus, especially as downtown begins its re-opening and pandemic restrictions slowly relax
- Nominations for the Honourary Citizen of Victoria are underway.
- FYI: The RNA will nominate former Councillor, Pamela Madoff.
- The cleanup of 24/7 camping areas continues. The work is expected to be less onerous than at the site beside the Provincial Court House some years past. Provincial funding is expected to offset some of the costs involved.

Neighbourhood update (Gary Pemberton - Neighbourhood Advisor, City of Victoria)

- BC Hydro is once again funding kits for groups and individuals to deal with graffiti on hydro poles and boxes in their neighbourhoods. See below for more details.

Around the Neighbourhood

*Traffic Calming (from Gary Pemberton, Neighbourhood Advisor)*

We have some upcoming traffic calming installations planned for Summer/Fall 2021 on Rockland Avenue, in response to longstanding resident concerns along the corridor.

on past and current data collection, we know that 85<sup>th</sup> percentile speeds on Rockland are in the 40-45 km/hr range, despite the posted 30k speed limit. Our new traffic calming program, started in 2020, is seeking to uplift some trials and treatments along Rockland Avenue, particularly within the Moss to St Charles stretch.

This includes:

- Trialing new traffic calming "islands" at 2 locations: Rockland @ Pemberton and Rockland @ Royal Terrace. These are the same yellow curb islands installed last year at the Oak Bay Avenue and Rockland crosswalk. However, on Rockland we are looking to place these yellow curbs in a centre median configuration, creating pinch points and slowing traffic down. There will be minor parking impacts associated with their installation. Given our trials elsewhere, we know this design can effectively address speeds, however we will monitor the installations and if successful, can roll out to other parts of the Rockland corridor.
- The Speed Reader Board, deferred from our 2020 program (due to shifting City priorities in covid), is now in our plans for 2021. The Rockland NA was asked in 2019 for recommendations on location, with the first preference facing westbound traffic in the S-curve between Moss and Royal Terrace. Despite some challenges with location due to bedrock, we have been able to site a suitable location, and the concrete base install will be slightly east of Robleda (north side, facing westbound traffic). We hope to get poles and equipment activated by Fall. Please note this is a permanent pole and base installation, now becoming a standard city-wide. We will not have the flexibility to relocate it once installed. Movable speed reader boards rely on the presence of City streetlight poles to mount to, which are few and far between. There are many Hydro poles, but we are not permitted to mount to these.

These initiatives above are all subject to Public Works crew availability but we anticipate installation in Summer or Fall 2021.
