

RNA July-August 2023 Newsletter

Dear Neighbours,

This feels like the last day of school before the summer holidays! Okay, there's always a bit of business to get through, but the promise of summer fun looms large on the horizon!

Synopsis of the June RNA Board Meeting:

Councillor's Report (Marg Gardiner)

- Council will soon be redoing the Official Community Plan (OCP). Consultation for past OCPs and in other jurisdictions usually takes 3 -4 years. Staff proposed doing this in 24 months over a 30 month period, and Council directed staff to shorten this timeframe. The new proposal shortens this time to 20 months and only one public engagement period and one public hearing are planned. While there will be several opportunities for people to attend engagement events during the engagement period, staff will not be consulting with neighbourhood associations or CALUC committees. Marg feels that much information may not get out to the public. Marg is going to write to us about Belton St (zero parking) and the OCP in the weeks ahead.
- The city is exploring taking over waste collection from condos.

Land Use

- 1737 Rockland re-zoning is not on the agenda yet. The LUC sent a letter to the city asking questions on issues such as road dedication and panhandle lot zoning bylaws. This proposal deviates on setbacks and height. (Note: on June 23, Marg Gardiner reported that 1737 Rockland is on the Committee of the Whole agenda for June 29th)

Despard Ave - The LUC would like their report to be referenced by staff in the report for council and public hearings.

- The Mayor directed staff to ask UDI (A developer lobbyist group) and CALUCs to comment on delegating minor variances. LUC Met with Robert Bateman We asked for city staff to send us the report before it went to council. A discussion ensued on this and on housing historically versus now.
- Development permits Minor variances are now delegated to staff.

Environment

Supporting Biodiversity in Local Communities (UBCM Resolution)

The RNA made a request to Rockland liaison Councillor Marg Gardiner to consider bringing a motion to council agenda *Supporting Biodiversity in Local Communities* (UBCM Resolution). It was seconded by Councillor Chris Coleman. The resolutions were passed at June 22nd, 2023 Committee of the Whole Meeting. On Vancouver Island the following municipalities have passed unanimously—Saanich, Metchosin, Esquimalt, Qualicum Beach, and Victoria.

Background for UBCM Resolution, June 22 2023 - CITY OF VICTORIA

Protecting and restoring biological diversity is consistent with Canada's commitments under the UN Convention on Biological Diversity and BC's commitments in the Together for Wildlife Strategy, as well as the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples and BC's Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act. Acting now to protect and restore biodiversity contributes

toward more resilient and healthy local communities – advancing community health and healthy waterways, watersheds, airsheds, and plant and animal species. These actions also make financial sense, containing emergency management and infrastructure costs in the context of climate change. Creating a Local Natural Areas Protection Fund provides a mechanism for the Province to partner with local governments, allocating funds to municipalities, regional districts and First Nations to support land acquisition for biodiversity and ecosystem health.

Traffic

- The OCP update changed Rockland Ave from a secondary collector to a collector road. Traffic counts are up, likely due to changes on Richardson St.
- Patricia would like to see a crosswalk at Royal Terrace.
- Warren Gardens received neighbourhood grant funds for street improvements.

From City Hall:

- The Cultural Infrastructure Grant program is distributing \$216,000 to support 7 not-for-profit arts and culture organizations in 2023. The CIG program is a direct-action item in the Create Victoria Arts and Culture Master Plan. This program provides funding to increase the accessibility, affordability and availability of cultural venues, which is a major goal of Create Victoria. The grant program helps leverage financial contributions from other levels of government and private contributions. The Belfry Theatre Society, Blue Bridge Theatre Society and Pacific Opera Victoria are receiving funding for specialized audio-visual and lighting equipment to support increased visual and auditory experiences for visitors and to enhance capabilities for artistic production. The Victoria Curling Club and the Intrepid Theatre Company Society are receiving funding for physical upgrades to increase the amount of usable space available for music and performing arts

events and the Victoria Conservatory of Music is receiving funding for a feasibility study to explore expanding its existing cultural facility. The Other Guise Theatre Company Society is receiving support for a new performing arts space in the downtown core.

The Capital Regional District Newsletter

No need to water your lawn this summer!

Did you know water use in the Capital Region almost doubles in the summertime? We are lucky to rely on the Sooke Lake Reservoir to supply us with safe, clean drinking water at the turn of a tap, however, on Southern Vancouver Island and the Gulf Islands our summers are typically hot and dry which puts pressure on our drinking water supply.

Using water wisely we can conserve our drinking water and remain resilient against "heat domes", wildfires and other climate events. Using less water does not only benefit the human residents of the Capital Region, but also plants, vital habitat, and endangered species.

Choosing to let our lawns go golden is the best way to conserve water. Lawns naturally go dormant during summer months and return to green with the fall rains. If you do choose to water your lawn, consider these water wise tips:

- Adjust your watering schedule following the CRD's <u>Stage 1 Watering</u> <u>Schedule</u>.
- 2. Use micro/drip irrigation systems for watering trees, shrubs, flowers, and veggie beds.

- 3. <u>Water your green lawns</u> a maximum of one inch (2.5 cm) of water per week in the driest conditions.
- 4. Practice the <u>cycle and soak method</u>, watering in short cycles with time inbetween to allow water to soak in and reduce water waste.
- 5. Weed often and add mulch around your plants to reduce evaporation, keep soil cool, reduce competition and add nutrients back into the soil. For lawns you can leave grass clippings to act as a mini mulch.

By conserving water during summer months, we can lower our water and energy bills, protect fish habitat in the Sooke, Charters and Goldstream Rivers, and support drinking water quality by maintaining higher water levels in our primary drinking water supply area.

We are privileged to enjoy some of the highest quality drinking water in the world maintaining this critical resource requires each of us to make water wise choices each and every day!




Photo: Glimpsing the Salish Sea, Government House.
