Shipping Containers Make for Creative Placemaking

A good public space is not only inviting but also builds a place for the community. Great spaces arise from collaboration with the users of the place and can provide the community with a sense of pride and ownership of their environment. In recent years, many organizations have turned to using shipping containers with hopes of transforming spaces. These containers can be used to beautify greenways and parklets and used as creative hubs, art installations and retail popups. The City of Langford installed multiple containers on Station Avenue creating a cultural

district used for retail space, markets and special events. It also features some amazing art installations. They transformed a difficult space into a creative hub and in the process, made a great community place. Police Recruits Engage with Community, Build Relationships Before Law Enforcement Training Begins



Seattle police recruits are getting to know members of the community and building relationships before hitting the streets as police officers. It's part of a new program called *Before the Badge*, a first-of-its-kind training program that focuses on building interpersonal relationships and officer wellness before law enforcement training. The program launched in May 2022 and has worked with about 70

recruits so far. This new training program serves as a chance for business owners, community members and leaders to engage with the recruits before they complete their training at the police academy. Kudos to the SPD for developing a culture of compassionate and equitable policing.
